As reported in the *New York Times* and the *Washington Post* today, a United States citizen from Atlanta, Georgia, on a trip to Bangladesh was murdered and his wife severely injured in a brutal attack meant to serve as revenge for blog posts he made promoting humanism, atheism, and skepticism towards Islam. The blogger, Avijit Roy, is not the first nontheistic blogger to be attacked or imprisoned for his views. However, as Mr. Roy was an American citizen and a constituent of Senators Isakson, Perdue, and Representative Price, the humanist community urges the relevant committees in both the House and Senate to hold hearings focusing on nonbelievers being persecuted globally by religious extremists for their views.

Ansar Bangla-7, an extremist religious group, has already claimed credit for Mr. Roy's death, which occurred after a group of assailants attacked Mr. Roy and his wife with machetes on a public street. This latest murder is the continuation of a series of hostile actions towards atheists in Bangladesh and around the world which attempt to silence nonbelievers through fear of a terrorist attack. The American Humanist Association strongly condemns such actions which seek to remove the basic human right to hold religious or non-religious views free from governmental oppression or societal discrimination.

Congress has a role to play in this ongoing tragedy, as it has the ability to influence governments of countries which are outwardly hostile towards nonbelievers or ones



that do not seek to protect the religious rights of all of their citizens, whether they are part of a minority religion or are nonreligious. By holding a hearing on this issue, Congress would signal to the world that international religious freedom is a top priority to the American people, and that the religious rights of all human beings, regardless of their specific views, are to be respected.
